We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of North Highlands Recreation and Park District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and have issued our report thereon dated October 13, 2020. We have previously communicated to you information about our responsibilities under auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and *Government Auditing Standards*, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant audit findings

Qualitative aspects of accounting practices

Accounting policies

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by North Highlands Recreation and Park District are described in Note 1 to the financial statements.

No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed.

We noted no transactions entered into by the entity during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. There were no accounting estimates affecting the financial statements which were particularly sensitive or required substantial judgments by management.

Financial statement disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. There were no particularly sensitive financial statement disclosures.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties encountered in performing the audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Uncorrected misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management did not identify and we did not notify them of any uncorrected financial statement misstatements.

Corrected misstatements

None of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditors' report. No such disagreements arose during our audit.

Management representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated October 13, 2020.

Management consultations with other independent accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the entity's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditors' opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Significant issues discussed with management prior to engagement

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to engagement as the entity's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our engagement.

Other information in documents containing audited financial statements

With respect to the required supplementary information (RSI) accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the RSI, including whether the RSI has been measured and presented in accordance with prescribed guidelines, whether the methods of measurement and preparation have been changed from the prior period and the reasons for any such changes, and whether there were any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the RSI. We compared the RSI for consistency with management's responses to the foregoing inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge obtained during the audit of the basic financial statements. Because these limited procedures do not provide sufficient evidence, we did not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the RSI.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors North Highlands Recreation and Park District North Highlands, California

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of North Highlands Recreation and Park District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the North Highlands Recreation and Park District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit includes performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the North Highlands Recreation and Park District as of June 30, 2020, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and the budgetary comparison for the General fund, as listed in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 13, 2020, on our consideration of the North Highlands Recreation and Park District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the North Highlands Recreation and Park District's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering North Highlands Recreation and Park District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

This section of the North Highlands Recreation and Park District's (District) annual financial report presents an analysis of the District's financial performance during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020. This information is presented in conjunction with the audited basic financial statements, which follows this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2020

- The assets of the District exceeded liabilities at the close of the 2019-2020 fiscal year by \$9,051,389 (net position). Of this amount \$1,119,304 is restricted for developer deposits, \$948,756 (unrestricted net position) may be used to meet ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors, and \$6,983,329 is invested in capital assets (net).
- As of June 30, 2020, the district's governmental funds reported combined fund balances of \$2,133,588 of which \$1,014,284 is available to meet the District's current and future needs (assigned/unassigned fund balance).
- At the end of the fiscal year, unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$1,014,284 or 57% of total general fund expenditures.
- The District had no long-term debt outstanding as of June 30, 2020.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the District's basic financial statements. The District's basic financial statements are comprised of three components, government - wide financial statements, fund financial statements, and notes to the basic financial statements. This report also includes additional required supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements.

REQUIRED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Government-Wide Financial Statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of District finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Position include information on the District's assets and liabilities and provide information about the nature and amounts of investments in resources (assets) and the obligations to District creditors (liabilities). Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

REQUIRED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

The Statement of Activities presents information showing how net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leave).

Both of these government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the District that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities). The governmental activities of the District are recreational and park activities. There are no business-type activities.

Fund Financial Statements are groupings of related accounts that are used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and to demonstrate finance-related legal compliance. All of the funds of the District can be reported into one category: *governmental funds*.

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental funds financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as of balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the District's near-term requirements. Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental funds balance sheet and the governmental funds statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the basic financial statements can be found immediately following the basic financial statements.

Other Information

In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report presents certain required supplementary information concerning the District's budgetary comparative information for the general fund.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

General fund revenues were budgeted at \$1,918,741 The actual revenues for the 2019-2020 fiscal year were \$1,894,381 or \$24,360 less than the final budget. Revenues from property taxes and use of money and property increased compared with the prior year. Intergovernmental revenues, charges for current services and other revenues decreased over prior year.

General fund expenditures were budgeted at \$2,038,908. The actual amount expended was \$1,772,730 or \$266,178 less than the final budget. The expenditure variance was due to salaries and benefits, services and supplies, and capital outlay expenditures during the fiscal year.

CAPITAL ASSETS

As of June 30, 2020, the District's net investment in capital assets totaled \$6,983,329 net of accumulated depreciation. The net investment in capital assets includes land, buildings and improvements, site improvements, and equipment. The capital assets are presented in the government-wide statement of net position.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET

Until Covid-19 impacted all district operations in mid-March 2020, revenues were trending in a positive direction. District recreation, rental, lease and other related revenues were all performing at or above expectations. From March through June 30, 2020 the District generated very little revenue as it was not offering any fee programs or services. To help offset the loss of revenue, the District was able to save funds due to reduced expenditures. It is unknown at this time how long District operations will be impacted by Covid-19; however, the District is anticipating continued loss of revenue through at least January 2021.

Many projects scheduled for FY 2019-2020 were cancelled due to Covid-19; however, the District was able to complete a number of projects prior to March. Those projects that were completed include installation of the new Community Center flooring and replacement of three HVAC units at the Recreation Center and District Office. Projects not completed in FY 2019-2020 will be reviewed again in December 2020 for possible funding.

The Lakes at Antelope, a new residential development located within the District's boundaries, has yet to break ground. The District did complete the Community Facilities District (CFD) in advance of the project start up. This will allow the developer to sell or develop the property and for the District to begin collecting fees once the project is able to break ground. Project improvement will occur offsite.

The Elverta residential development reached full build out in June 2020. The District is now collecting the full amount of fees from the 183 property owners. These funds can only be used for maintenance at this site.

The District will apply for Round 3 Proposition 68 grant funds to construct a new neighborhood park (Sierra Creek Park) near The Lakes at Antelope development. It is anticipated that if the District is successful in securing Prop 68 grant funds, that in combination with Developer Park Impact Fees and District Reserves, the District will have sufficient funds for park design and construction. Depending upon the revenue sources available to the District, the future development of Sierra Creek Park may need to be accomplished in one or more phases.

The District has secured \$200,000 in Prop 68 Per Capita Grant Funds. Per Capita Grant funds are project based and require a District match of twenty percent (20%). Per Capita grant funds will be used to supplement, not supplant, local revenues. Proposed projects must be completed by 2024.

The District experienced several changes in its full time work force. The District hired one full time Maintenance Worker, a Recreation Superintendent, and a Recreation Supervisor, but also lost one full time Office Assistant which will not be replaced at this time.

Completed or Partially Completed District Goals FY 2019-2020

- Completed the installation of three HVAC units at the Recreation Center and District Office complex.
- Initiated the California Environmental Quality Act study for Sierra Creek Park. Contracted through Sacramento County.
- Phase II of the Community Center landscaping project was completed in early 2020.
- Automated External Defibrillators were installed in the District office and Community Center.
- Roof reseal project for various District buildings has been completed.

District Goals for FY 2020-2021

- Reopen the District Office Complex and resume regular community services and programs once local and state Covid-19 guidelines allow this to occur.
- Install Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) automatic electronic doors at the office complex and community center.
- Complete ADA concrete pathway replacement project.
- Complete ADA Transition Plan.
- Secure Proposition 68 new park grant.
- Initiate first of two Prop 68 Per Capita grant projects (new sign board at 6040 Watt Avenue)

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Entity

The District was organized in 1955 by a vote of the public. It is operated under the advisement of a five-member board of directors duly elected and empowered by the electorate with sole authority over the District's operations. Although the District is now independent from the Sacramento County's Board of Supervisors, its financial activities are still processed through the Sacramento County Auditor-Controller's Office.

In addition to providing recreational programs and services to the community, the District maintains park sites and leases property for the purpose of providing additional services to the community. The accounting policies of the District conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applicable to governments.

Component Unit

The District's Board of Directors approved the formation of the Community Facilities District (CFD) No. 2016-01 (Elverta Park) which authorized a special tax levy within CFD 2016-01 for the purpose of providing services for maintenance, servicing and replacement of existing park and recreation facilities for the 3.03 acre Elverta Park development and incidental expenses.

B. Basis of Accounting

Government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned or, for property tax revenues, in the period for which levied. Expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows.

Governmental funds are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when both measurable and available. Measurable means the amount of the transaction can be determined and available means collectible in the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Resources not available to finance expenditures and commitments of the current period are recognized as unearned revenue or as a reservation of fund balance. The District considers property taxes available if they are collected within 60 days after year-end. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred. Principal and interest on general long-term debt, as well as compensated absences and claims and judgments are recorded only when payment is due. General capital acquisitions are reported as capital outlay expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of general long-term debt and capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

C. Basis of Presentation

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The statement of net position and statement of activities display information about the primary government (the District). These statements include the financial activities of the overall government. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees charged to external parties.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the program expenses of a given function are offset by program revenues. Program expenses include direct expenses, which are clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues include 1) charges paid by the recipient of goods or services offered by the programs and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide information about the District's funds. The emphasis of fund financial statements is on major governmental funds, each displayed in separate columns. All remaining governmental funds (if any) are separately aggregated and reported as nonmajor funds.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund – This fund accounts for all the financial resources not required to be accounted for in another fund. This fund consists primarily of general government type activities.

Developer In-Lieu Fees Fund – This special revenue fund accounts for the activity of the developer in lieu fees and park development fees.

Park Development Fees Fund – This special revenue fund accounts for the activity of the park development fees.

Community Facillities District 2016-01 Fund – This special revenue fund accounts for the activity of the Community Facilities District 2016-01.

D. Restricted Assets

Restricted assets are financial resources generated for a specific purpose such as construction of improvements and financing of debt obligations. These amounts are restricted, as their use is limited by applicable bond covenants or other external requirements.

E. Capital Assets

Capital assets, recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual historical cost is not available, are reported in governmental activities column of the government-wide financial statements. Contributed fixed assets are valued at their acquisition value. Capital assets include land, buildings and building improvements and equipment. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Depreciation is recorded in the government-wide financial statements on the straight-line basis over the useful life of the assets as follows:

F. Deferred Inflows of Resources

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. The separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The District only has one type of item, which arises only under a modified accrual basis of accounting that qualifies for reporting in this category. Accordingly, the item, unavailable revenue, is reported only in the governmental funds balance sheet. This account represents miscellaneous revenue from a settlement and is deferred and recognized as inflow of resources in the period that the amount becomes available.

G. Compensated Absences

Compensated absences represent the vested portion of accumulated vacation. In accordance with GASB Statement 16, the liability for accumulated leave includes all salary - related payments that are directly and incrementally connected with leave payments to employees, such as retirement pay. A current liability is recorded in the governmental fund type to account for these vested leave accruals, which are expected to be used within the next fiscal year.

H. Equity Classifications

In the fund financial statements, in accordance with GASB Statement No. 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions," governmental funds report balances as nonspendable, restricted, committed assigned or unassigned based primarily on the extent the District is bound to honor constraints on how specific amounts can be spent.

- Nonspendable Fund Balance consists of amounts that are not in a spendable form or are required to be maintained intact.
- Restricted Fund Balance consists of amounts that can be spent only for the specific purposes stipulated by external resource providers, constitutionally, or through enabling legislation. The Restricted Developer In-Lieu Fees are for capital improvements of recreational facilities.
- Committed Fund Balance consists of amounts that can be used only for the specific purposes determined by a formal action (resolution) of the District's highest level of decision-making authority (the board of directors) and do not lapse at yearend.
- Assigned Fund Balance consists of amounts intended for a specific purpose by the board of directors or by a District official that has been delegated authority to adding amounts.
- Unassigned Fund Balance consists of any remaining fund balance that has not been reported in any other classification.

Per the District's Policy, when an expenditure occurs that can be funded by more than one classification of fund balance the District considers fund balance to be spent in the following order: first restricted, then committed, then assigned, and finally unassigned.

The District classifies its net position into three components: net investment in capital assets, restricted net position, and unrestricted net position.

- Net Investment in Capital Assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of these assets.
- Restricted net position are financial resources generated for a specific purpose such as construction of improvements and financing of debt obligations. These amounts are restricted, as their use is limited by applicable bond covenants or other external requirements.
- Unrestricted are all other net assets that do not meet the definition of "net investment in capital assets" or "restricted."

I. Property Taxes

The District receives property taxes from the County of Sacramento, which has been assigned the responsibility for assessment, collections, and apportionment of property taxes for all taxing jurisdictions within the County. Secured property taxes are levied on January 1 for the following fiscal year and on which date it becomes a lien on real property. Secured property taxes are due in two installments on November 1 and February 1 and are delinquent after December 10 and April 10, respectively, for the secured roll. Based on a policy by the County called the Teeter Plan, 100% of the allocated taxes are transmitted by the County to the District, eliminating the need for an allowance for uncollectible. The County, in return, receives all penalties and interest. Property taxes on the unsecured roll are due on the January 1 lien date and become delinquent if unpaid by August 31. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the fiscal year for which the taxes are levied.

J. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

E. Investment in Government Pool

Investments are accounted for in accordance with the provisions of GASB Statement 31, which requires governmental entities to report certain investments at fair value in the balance sheet and recognize the corresponding change in fair value of investments in the year in which the change occurred. The District reports its investment in the Sacramento County investment pool at fair value based on quoted market information obtained from fiscal agents or other sources if the change is material to the financial statements.

NOTE 6 PARK DEDICATION FUNDS

The County maintains two funds for the benefit of the North Highlands Recreation and Park District. The corpus of the funds consists of in lieu fees paid by developers for subdivision development within the boundaries of the District. The use of these funds by the District is restricted for the purpose of providing park and recreation facilities to serve the population. The activity of these funds is recorded in the special revenue fund of the District.

NOTE 7 RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors, and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The District together with other districts in the State carry California Association For Park And Recreation Insurance (CAPRI), a public entity risk pool currently operating as a common risk management and insurance program for member districts. The District pays an annual premium to CAPRI for its general insurance coverage. Furthermore the District carries workers compensation coverage with other districts in the State through the CAPRI. Membership in the California Association of Recreation and Park Districts is required when applying for CAPRI.

The Agreement for Formation provides that CAPRI will be self-sustaining through member premiums. CAPRI reinsures through commercial companies for claims up to \$10,000,000 for general and automobile liability and all risk property insurance, including boiler and machinery coverage, is subject to a \$2,000 deductible occurrence payable by the District.

Financial statements for CAPRI are available at the District's office for fiscal year ended June 30, 2020.

The District carries commercial insurance for other risks of loss, including employees' health insurance.

NOTE 8 SITE LEASE AGREEMENTS

District as Lessor

SETA/Headstart Lease Agreement: The District entered into a site lease agreement with Sacramento Employment and Training Agency (SETA) whereby the District leases the Strizek Park Clubhouse to SETA for the Headstart program. The five (5) year lease was renewed July 1, 2019 and will expire June 30, 2024. Monthly payments of \$2,055 are due and payable at the end of each month. SETA will continue to be responsible for paying all utilities including electricity, gas, water, sewer, garbage, and waste removal.

Center Joint Unified School District Lease Agreement: The District entered into a site lease agreement with Center Joint Unified School District whereby the District leases a portion of Spinelli Park to the School District for the purpose of installing, operating, and maintaining five modular buildings for elementary school classrooms and administrative facilities related to Spinelli Elementary School. The lease expires in 2021 with annual payments ranging from \$4,000 to \$5,000 each year, due and payable on August 1 of each year.

Jamie Throckmorton dba Something Extra Lease Agreement: The District entered into a (5) five year site lease agreement Jamie Throckmorton (dba, Something Extra) for the purpose of operating a daycare facility at the Capehart Youth Facility. The term of the lease starts September 1, 2018 and expires September 1, 2023. Rent starts at \$2,617 and is adjusted annually and will cap at \$3,085 beginning year 5 of the agreement. The agreement also requires the operator to pay for utility costs of \$820 per month.

All Star Specialty Events, Inc. Softball Lease Agreement: The District entered into a (5) five year lease agreement with a new operator - All Star Specialty Events, Inc. The term is January 1, 2019 expiring December 31, 2023. All Star Specialty Events, Inc. is authorized to run organized softball tournaments and other related programs at this facility. Rent is adjusted annually with a starting rent of \$5,000 per month capped at \$5,400 per month beginning 2023. The operator also will have a \$5,000 non-performance deposit with the District. The operator is responsible for following all requirements, regulations, laws, etc. as noted in the agreement.

NOTE 9 DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PENSION PLAN

The District contributes to a deferred compensation plan. The plan is a single-employer plan with the assets held in trust by Voya Retirement Insurance and Annuity Company. All full time salaried employees are eligible to participate in the plan after six months of satisfactory employment with the District. The plan is defined in the Internal Revenue Code Section 457.

The District pays 100% of the contribution, based on eight percent of the employee's wage. Participant accounts are credited with the employer contributions. Investment earnings and losses as well as administrative expenses are also charged to participant accounts. Allocations are based on participant's earnings and losses of chosen investments or account balances. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the vested portion of the participant's account. The employee becomes vested in the employer contribution after two years from date of hire. The employer contribution stays with the pool if the employee leaves before vesting. The District contributed \$54,091 during the 2019/20 fiscal year towards the qualifying employee's plan.

In case of partial or complete termination of the plan or discontinuance of employer contribution to the plan, the rights to the plan benefits become fully vested regardless of any other provisions of the plan and trusts. The trust accounts would continue until all accounts have been distributed in accordance with the provisions of the plan.

Upon participant termination from services due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or installments over a period selected by the participant. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution. The portion of the account that is not vested upon termination will be used to offset future employer contributions.

The District also offers its employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457. The plan, available to all District employees, permits them to defer a portion of their salary until future years through payroll deductions with no employer match. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death, or unforeseeable emergencies.

NOTE 10 REVENUE LIMITATIONS IMPOSED BY CALIFORNIA PROPOSITION 218

Proposition 218, which was approved by the voters in November 1996, regulates the District's ability to impose, increase, and extend taxes and assessments. Any new increase or extended taxes and assessments subject to the provisions of Proposition 218, requires voter approval before they can be implemented. Additionally, Proposition 218 provides that these taxes and assessments are subject to voter initiative and may be rescinded in the future years by the voters.

NOTE 11 FUND BALANCES - GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

The District adopted a policy for GASB Statement 54, *Fund Balance Reporting*. GASB Statement 54 establishes fund balance classifications that comprise a hierarchy based on the extent to which a government is bound to observe constraints imposed upon the use of the resources reported in governmental funds. While the classifications of fund balance in the District's various governmental funds were revised, the implementation of this standard had no effect on total fund balance.

NOTE 12 CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Grants are subject to audit to determine compliance with their requirements. District officials believe that if any refunds are required, they would not have a significant effect on the financial condition or liquidity of the District.

The District is unaware of any pending litigation or other contingencies which would have a material effect on the financial condition or liquidity of the District. In the normal course of business, the District is a subject to various lawsuits. In the opinion of the General Counsel to the District, payment of claims by the District for amounts not covered by insurance, in the aggregate, are not expected to have a material adverse effect on their financial position.

NOTE 13 EFFECTS OF COVID-19:

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared the spread of the Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) a worldwide pandemic. The COVID-19 pandemic is having significant effects on global markets, supply chains, businesses, and communities. Specific to the District, COVID-19 may continue to impact various parts of its 2021 operations and financial results including, but not limited to, lost revenue due to shutdown preventing fee programs from operating, costs for emergency preparedness, and shortages of personnel. Management believes the District is taking appropriate actions to mitigate the negative impact. However, the full impact of COVID-19 is unknown and cannot be reasonably estimated as these events are still developing.

NOTE 1 BUDGETS AND BUDGETARY ACCOUNTING

As required by State law the District prepares and legally adopts a final operating budget. Public hearings were conducted on the proposed and final budget to review all appropriations and the sources of financing.

The budgets for the general fund and the Community Facilities District 2016-01 fund are adopted on the modified accrual basis of accounting. The budget for these funds are the only legally adopted budgets since the District does not adopt budgets for the Developer In-Lieu and the Park Development Fees Funds.

At the object level, actual expenditures cannot exceed budgeted appropriations. Management can transfer budgeted amounts between expenditure accounts within an object without the approval of the board of directors. Significant amendments and appropriation transfers between objects or funds must be approved by the board of directors. Appropriations lapse at fiscal year-end.

The budgetary data presented in the accompanying financial statements includes all revisions approved by the board of directors.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of the North Highlands Recreation and Park District (District) as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements and and have issued our report thereon dated October 13, 2020.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency or a combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.



Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of the audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.
